## HILL USED AS CLASSROOM

Children from Air Balloon Hill Junior School, which is celebrating its centenary this year, have been given field trips to Troopers Hill during February and March. The teachers of the seven and eight year olds were helped to organise the trips by Helen Adshead of the Avon Wildlife Trust and Sally Oldfield, Local Nature Reserves Officer. Together with parents, children and teachers they spent 3 sessions on the hillside investigating its plants, animals and the industrial history of the site. After the trips class based activities followed in which all the children participated in the production of paintings and posters. They helped to produce newly decorated sides for the Friends' gazebo and a tablecloth that will be used at events in future on the Hill and at events in the city to popularise the Hill as a Local Nature Reserve. There are pictures of all kinds of animals and plants that live on the Hill as well as the trademark chimney. Six children – Chloe, Joe, Jakob, Jenna, Karley and Bradley won prizes of bug pots (containers with magnifying lenses on top for looking at bugs!) for their posters and are now hard at work using these in the local area. ## BIKER BOVVER

Anyone walking around Malvern Road open space at the weekend or on a weekday evening over the last few months cannot fail to have noticed the young lads who use the space mounted on a variety of motorised bikes. They make a lot of noise and insist on skidding around the field to the danger of children playing, dogs sniffing and the rest of us just trying to enjoy the quiet space. The problem seems to be the fact that the bikes can easily get round the existing gateway into the field at the Malvern Road entrance. At the moment plans are well in hand to replace the old gate with a similar entrance to the new one at the Summerhill Terrace end of the field. This new one will have special provisions made for wheelchair access, and will be much more difficult for the bikers to get through. Thank goodness!

## SURVEY FINDINGS

Friends have delivered over 1700 copies of a questionnaire in recent weeks to find out what people living close to the Malvern Road Open Space would like to see done with the area. Many of you have sent in your ideas and comments. 10% of the questionnaires were completed and returned which is a very good response according to the experts. Most of the people who replied are regular visitors to the area who come to have a stroll, look after children, walk the dog or use the slide. Nearly half the people who replied said that the thing they most disliked about the space was the dog mess. A similar number of

replies said they would like to see the play area improved from its current dismal state and most of these people said they would like to see any new facilities fenced off from dogs and better protected from vandals. Many also said that they thought it would be a good idea to resite the play area to another part of the space. Other people commented on the need for benches, more paths, draining the muddy areas on the field and of course doing something about the groups of youths with their motorbikes, noise and cans of drink. The Friends group will make sure that these findings are given to the appropriate people in the Council.

Some of you said that you would consider helping us to organise events on the Hill and the Space so we will be contacting you to tell you about how to join in soon.

There are lots more things that people said but you will have to come to the next meeting if you want to know more – we don't bite! See below for the details.

We would like to welcome the many people who returned questionnaires and are now on our mailing list. This is currently over 150 extra households. We will, of course, continue to deliver the newsletter by hand where required and please do let Susan know if you require a copy but don't receive one.
