HILL MORE CONVENIENT FOR DOGS

Two new dog poo bins have been erected on the Hillside. One just inside the north-east entrance

(next to the Malvern Road Playing field) and one at the bottom next to the Crews Hole Road entrance. Friends hope this will help cut down on the amount of dog fouling on the Hill. They have been paid for by the Bristol Parks Department and installed as a part of the Management Plan that the Friends developed with Bristol Parks last year.

WORKERS MAKE AMENDS

Following the report in the last newsletter about contractors cutting the grass at the wrong time we are glad to report that things are looking up. Over the last few weeks the Hill has been visited several times by the contractors the Council employs to maintain the paths and cut the grass. Their welcome activities mean the Hill is now less littered, its paths are mostly clear of weeds and an abandoned motorbike has been disposed of. EVENTS ON THE HILL

The Friends have held two free public events on the hill since our last Newsletter was published. On the Bank Holiday Monday at the end of May Helen took us on a very informative walk, identifying flowering plants, describing how people used them in the past and what they might be used for today. This was a very enjoyable morning; many thanks to Helen. In June the Friends were joined by the Bristol and District Moth Group to discover some of the hill's most secretive nocturnal wildlife. Light traps were set to attract moths and over eighty different species were recorded, these included a spectacular Elephant Hawk Moth.

The event was very well attended with lots of local children staying up late. As well as moths, we also saw some bats and were able to pick up bats' echolocation using bat detectors. There are photos of this and other past events on our website.

If you attended these events please let us know what you thought. We are also keen to know what sort of events you would like in the future.

FUND RAISING

We've spent all the money we got from the Lottery – the evidence of where it has gone is all over the Hill (no, not the empty beer cans!). We've applied for more money from various places but with no luck as yet. Friends have been dreaming up ways of raising the cash needed to keep the work on the Hill going and to fund the various events that we have planned in the near future. We do not charge entrance for our events but we will in future be inviting donations. We hope to raise some funds from the Balloon Race on the 13th Aug but if you have any

Following the survey of your views by questionnaire on the future of the Malvern Road Open Space we are pleased to report that enough of you said you would consider getting involved in the organisation of events there to have a meeting to discuss what to do. This meeting was held in July and decided to hold a further meeting with Bristol Parks to discuss the options for replacing the play equipment. In the survey 81 out of 173 people who replied said they wanted to improve the play area, possibly with a change of site to another part of the open space and fenced off from dogs.
