how much FOTH had been doing. Not surprising really as it's never been our policy to make a song and dance about it.

A lot of our work is either taken for granted or just plain isn't noticed. Make no mistake about it though, we carry out crucial work that just wouldn't get done if we weren't around.

For a start, we work directly with Bristol Parks to ensure that regular maintenance and repairs are carried out. This is not about keeping their costs down – indeed we cost them <u>more</u> money - but because we tell them about what needs to be done. They can't patrol Troopers Hill "just in case" something needs doing. We think the results of this have been visible this year with the paths been kept noticeably clearer and the virulent Japanese Knotweed being treated regularly. Hats off to the maintenance team for that.


Then there is the regular maintenance we carry out ourselves: repairing fence or steps, keeping bracken and bramble under control. If we aren't there to do it, the whole hill and its precious acid grassland will eventually become overgrown with trees and bushes. If you doubt that, visit our website and look at the photographs from 50 years ago. No trees on the hill at all!

We can't, however, continue indefinitely without your support. We shall enclose a short survey with our next Newsletter seeking your opinions. When you receive it, please DO fill it in and return it to us. We need to know what you think about our work and that you really support us.

More than that though, we really need your physical support. We seriously need to see some new faces at our work parties, particularly during the winter months when birds aren't nesting. Join us for a couple of hours of light work and enjoy a cup of coffee with us afterwards. Without your help, we may eventually have to call a halt to our efforts on your behalf.

The events we arrange, from storytelling to dawn choruses, fungal forays to a speaker for a history talk, tend to cost anything up to £100. Other costs from meeting rooms, laminating pouches for notices, to first aid supplies and unexpected repair bills all mean our true running costs are close to £1,000 a year.

These costs are kept down considerably thanks to volunteers who deliver the majority of paper newsletters by hand. This year Bristol Parks have been printing our newsletters for us and have also funded our meeting rooms. We cannot, however, depend on the same funding for 2006.

A very big "Thank You" is due to Local Nature Reserves Officer, Sally Oldfield. She is our link to experts for everything carrying out fungi surveys to setting up light traps and identifying moths and has given us tireless support again this year. She also helps us to identify important sources of funding and gives us invaluable guidance when we have to consider any ecological issues in relation to the hill.









Particularly good news for 2006 is that we will be benefiting from the Casual Dress day collection at Somerfield's Whitchurch Support Centre. It takes place on Friday, 30th June, 2006 and the proceeds, shared with Folly Farm, should mean around £350 for our LNR.

INTERNET FOR ALL

Friends of Troopers Hill are always going on about our website. However, many of you do not have Internet access and may not be able to view all the interesting photos, articles and videos that are available there. Your local library, in addition to lending books and hiring out DVDs or videos, has free access to the Internet so that you can visit our site and make use of the vast amount of information available worldwide.



One of the reasons that Internet became popular quickly is that it is extremely easy to use. The library staff don't claim to be experts but are always willing to help you if they can. You can e-mail us or your friends, visit our new message board or have instant message chats with people all around the world. You can also scan in your photos to email to your loved ones on the other side of the world and you can print out their replies although there is a small charge for that.

Jan Hartwell of Bristol Libraries tells us that St. George has 7 computers available for anybody to use. All you have to do is register for a library card (it's free), then get a pin code from the desk and you too can log on and "surf the net" to your heart's content.

Also based in the library is Learn Direct who run learning courses in how to use computers, maths and English. Speak to Jane or Leanne to get further information. They can start you off learning how to use computers from a complete beginner level up to level 2 which will enable you to qualify for a "European Computer Driving Licence". The cost is £15 but you must be over 19 and have been resident in the EU for 3 years. A free trial is available if you are eligible. Call them on:

Work Parties finished 2005 in the same way as we started: our December date became the first since January to be cancelled due to rain. Despite this we have had a very successful year. Perhaps the most visible achievement was the fitting of the new signs at the entrances. These were purchased with last year's lottery grant and have received some very favourable comments.

Two areas where bramble is encroaching on broom have received our attention this year, one above Troopers Hill Road and the other in Sally's Glade. Since the vegetation in Sally's Glade is not so dense we can work there during the bird nesting season and so that is where we spent a very enjoyable sunny Saturday morning in May.

The bracken on the hill was attacked on three different occasions, this is definitely a task where many hands make light work and it is surprising how quickly areas can be cleared.

In February we cleared several Holm Oak and other saplings, this is necessary to maintain the acid grass and heathland which is the Hill's most precious environment.

There is always room for more people at work parties, so please join us. If you can't make Saturdays but would like to help at other times, please let us know. If enough people are interested we are keen to start weekday work parties.

WILDSPACE! EXPLAINED

The Bristol Wildspace project, is funded grant called by a "Wildspace!" As part of this, Troopers Hill currently receives some extra support from Bristol Parks in the form of a Local Nature Reserves Officer. There are three other Local Nature Reserves (LNRs) in Bristol, and three proposed LNRs. The LNR Officer works with all these sites to promote community involvement and run events so that as many people as possible can enjoy discovering these exciting special places.

''The Friends of Troopers Hill" was set up as part of the LNR project. Thanks to a fantastic response from the local community and some very hard-working and enthusiastic volunteers, this group has gone from strength to strength.

The Friends of Troopers Hill has achieved an enormous amount during the last two years. Bristol Parks recognises the very important role that community groups like this have in supporting our green spaces. By working in partnership, we can better ensure that Troopers Hill reflects the needs of the local community.

Funding for the Local Nature Reserve Project runs out in Summer 2006. However Bristol Parks is currently seeking new funding in the hope of expanding the network of LNRs in Bristol for the benefit of both people and wildlife
